



Composition


Composition is the way parts of a drawing or picture are arranged. Balanced composition means having an even amount of parts, such as lines and shapes.






Dimension

Dimension is the amount of space an object takes up. Drawings are created on a flat surface and have length and width but not depth. So, they are two-dimensional. You can give an object depth by layering colors and adding shadow. This makes it look like it's popping off the page!









Shadow

Shadow is created by the way light shines on an object. Look outside on a sunny day.

See how the sunlight shines on a tree? The side of the tree with more sunlight appears lighter than the other side.






The pug is often called "a lot of dog in a little body." Its strong personality is part of what makes it so lovable. Pugs are loyal and want to please their owners. They are originally from China and are usually **fawn** or black in color. The pug is known for its wrinkled face, muscular body, and tightly curled tail.





Draw a circle for the head, a circle for the snout, and an oval for the body.






Add lines for the legs and two rounded triangles for the ears. Don't forget the curly pug tail!










Add final details to the face, body, and feet.




ART TIP

The harder you push on your pencil, the thicker and darker your line will be.





POMERANIAN

The perky Pomeranian is a cheerful companion for many people. It is smart and aims to make its owners happy. Pomeranians are bold, playful, and alert. Originally from Pomerania (now Germany), they were bred down from sled and herding dogs. They weigh just three to seven pounds (1 to 3 kg). The Pomeranian is known for its thick double coat and pointed, foxlike face.



Draw circles for the head, snout, and body.




Finish outlining the body and feet. Detail the face.





Add lines for the legs, and draw rounded ears.





Add final detail to the face, body, and feet.



Finish this little guy by coloring in light tan fur.




ART TIP

Layer your colors when filling in the outlined drawing. Start with one color. Then, add another color over it. This provides shadow and dimension.

Outline the finished drawing with a thin, black marker.







ENGLISH BULLDOG


The English bulldog is one of the most mellow dog breeds. Its gentle yet protective manner makes it a popular dog for families. Bulldogs are **confident** and can be **stubborn**. They originated in Great Britain and have a short coat that often has **blotches** or spots. The bulldog is known for its short, muscular body, noticeable under bite, and slow-moving shuffle.




Draw circles for the head and snout. Draw an oval for the body.








Add details to the head and face.
Outline the body, legs, and tail.





Bulldogs are husky, so give yours some neck rolls! Then finish detailing the legs, body, and face.




ART TIP

Add spots to the bulldog if you want. Just draw shapes to define areas of color on its face or body.





PEMBROKE CORGI


The corgi is the smallest type of herding dog. Originally from Wales, *corgi* means "dwarf dog" in Welsh. The corgi has a long, low body and a thick coat. The Pembroke Welsh corgi has pointed ears, in contrast to the Cardigan Welsh corgi's rounded ears. Its color can be red, **sable**, black, **fawn**, or tan, and it can have white markings. The corgi is active, agreeable, and **affectionate**.


Draw a circle for the head, an oval for the body, and a rounded triangle for the snout.



Draw lines for the legs and a half circle for the hip. This corgi is running!


Add details to the face and body, and draw triangles for the ears. Finish outlining the legs.








Add more details to the corgi's fur, face, and ears. Draw lines on the body to help show dimension.




ART TIP


Add a small, white dot to the eye. This makes it look like light is reflecting off the eye, which makes the dog look more lifelike.

Outline the finished drawing with a thin, black marker.



Color your corgi! This one is fawn with white markings.







STANDARD POODLE

Unlike what many people think, the poodle is not French. The **breed** began in Germany, assisting hunters in water. Poodles are smart, **obedient**, and social. Many poodles work as Seeing Eye dogs or therapy dogs. The poodle has a thick, curly coat that is white, black, apricot, or gray. The standard poodle has been bred down to two other sizes: miniature and toy.


Draw circles for the head and body. Draw a rounded rectangle for the snout.




Define the legs, face, and body.
Add an eye, nose, and mouth.




Add lines to the body for the legs. Don't forget the tail!
Keep in mind the poodle's puffy, shaped coat.



Give the poodle its famous puffy coat! Outline it with a wavy line, defining its curls. Finish detailing the legs and face.




Color your poodle. This one is black. Shade it to add dimension.




ART TIP

A dog or cat's coat can be drawn by using straight, jagged, or wavy lines, depending on the type!

Outline the finished drawing with a thin, black marker.







LABRADOR RETRIEVER


The loyal Labrador retriever is the most popular dog **breed** in the United States. It's easy to see why. Its friendly manner and **affectionate**, playful personality make the Lab a good family dog. Labs were first bred in Newfoundland, Canada, to retrieve fishing nets. They have short, water-resistant coats. Labs come in three colors: yellow, black, and chocolate, or brown.

Draw a circle for the head, an oval for the body, and a rounded rectangle for the snout.





Add more detail to the head, legs, and body. Draw in feet, and give the Lab an ear.






ART TIP

Start with a balanced composition of shapes from the first step. This gives the final drawing a stronger feel.




Outline the finished drawing with a thin, black marker.





Color your Lab. This one is yellow.






PERSIAN CAT

The Persian is a popular cat **breed**. It is known for its long coat. It has the longest coat of any cat breed! People love the Persian's sweet, gentle nature and big, expressive eyes. This cat has a broad, short body and heavy-boned legs. These features make the Persian more likely to lounge around than leap!



Draw three circular shapes for the head, body, and tail.




Give the Persian its wild fur by drawing jagged lines around the head, body, and tail. Add eyes, a nose, and a mouth.





Add lines for the legs and two triangles for the ears.





Detail the fur a bit more to show dimension. Define the feet, and give the cat some whiskers!






Be aware of how many whiskers you add. Shoot for balance within the composition.

Outline the finished drawing with a thin, black marker.



Color your Persian cat. This one is white with green eyes.





SIAMESE CAT

The Siamese cat was once thought of as **sacred** in Siam (now Thailand). It has almond-shaped blue eyes, dark **points**, and a long, thin body. The Siamese is known to be loud. It is the most **vocal** house cat! The Siamese is smart and likes to play. It also enjoys lying in its owner's lap.

Draw two circles for the head and the snout. Then, add an oval for the body.



Outline the entire body and head. Then add detail to the face, including the eyes, nose, and mouth.



Draw lines for the legs, two triangles for the ears, and a curled tail.



Draw lines on the body where you want the cat's points to be. Finish


detailing the feet and face. Add whiskers!



The curve of a cat's tail indicates different emotions. Explore this idea by changing the position or shape of the tail!



Outline the finished drawing with a thin, black marker.








CALICO CAT

The calico is not a **breed** of cat. Calico refers to the cat's coloring. Calico cats are white, with some orange and black patches. Sixteen different cat breeds can have the calico pattern. They include the Persian, Manx, and Scottish fold.

Draw a circle for the head, a long oval for the body, and a curved line for the tail.



2 Draw lines for the legs and triangles for the ears.



Finish the legs and feet. Add final details to the face, including whiskers. Finally, draw jagged lines where you want the calico's fur markings to be.




ART TIP

Draw simple, curved lines to the body of a cat or dog. This makes it look more realistic because it gives the animal dimension.

SPHYNX CAT


The sphynx cat is known for its hairless, wrinkled body and large, pointed ears. It is energetic and doesn't shy away from being the center of attention. The sphynx is a loyal companion and enjoys spending time with its owners. Because it lacks fur, this cat likes to nestle under a blanket to keep warm.

Draw two circles for the head and snout. Then, draw a long oval for the body. Add a thin, curved tail.




Add lines for the legs and triangles for the ears.

Fill in the face with details.
Then, outline the legs and add details to the body, including wrinkly skin!



Finish the face and ears, and







Not all cats have whiskers. Some sphynx cats do not. Try drawing one without whiskers to see how this changes the look of the final drawing!



Outline the finished drawing with a thin, black marker.




Add color to your sphynx. All the usual cat markings can be found on sphynx skin. So, add some spots if you want!




Fuzzy Feel


